INDUSTRIAL ARTS EDUCATION

In 2024, The Crucible delivered a robust schedule of industrial arts education, empowering thousands of youth and adults to explore creativity, build technical skills, and connect through hands-on learning. Our classes continued to embody The Crucible's mission: making the industrial arts accessible, inclusive, and relevant to our Oakland community and beyond.

847 Classes Across 19 Departments

This year, The Crucible offered 847 classes in a wide range of industrial arts disciplines, including Blacksmithing, Welding, Ceramics, Glass Flameworking, Foundry, Woodworking, Jewelry, Textiles, Enameling, and more. Taught by expert faculty in a dynamic, safety-first environment, these classes gave students direct access to tools, techniques, and traditions that are increasingly rare and deeply valuable.

3,697 Students Served

A total of 3,697 students engaged in Crucible programming in 2024, ranging from absolute beginners to returning artists and makers. Our industrial arts classes continued to attract a diverse community of learners looking to gain practical skills, creative confidence, and community connection.

Lifelong Learning and Community Access

Adult learners participated in evening and weekend courses across all disciplines, many pursuing personal growth, creative entrepreneurship, or new career pathways. Our commitment to affordability was reflected in our scholarship program, as well as free and low-cost public offerings in the Bike Shop, and our community events including open studios.

YOUTH FIELD TRIPS

For many young people, The Crucible's free Field Trips offered to OUSD and Title I schools throughout the Bay are their first exposure to the industrial arts.

During our Field Trips, youth witness demonstrations by artists and industry experts in Glass Flameworking, Glass Blowing, Welding, Blacksmithing, Foundry, and more.

Instructors describe the processes, tools, and applications they use to make projects from metal, glass, and other materials, inspiring youth from K-12 to make connections between the arts and sciences. Our field trips support academic studies in schools, introduce young people to trade jobs and pathways, and are often where youth first learn about The Crucible's classes, youth scholarships, Fuego Youth Leadership Program, and more!

SUMMER CAMPS

Summer Camps at The Crucible consist of six weeks packed with industrial art programming across all 12 of our department areas available to youth ages 8-18. During the summer, youth can engage in hands-on courses such as Glass Blowing, Flameworking, Printmaking, Paper Sculpture, Foundry, Bike Shop, TIG Welding, MIG Welding, Stick Welding, Machine Shop, Blacksmithing, Woodshop, Enameling, Woodturning, Jewelry, Ceramics, Neon, Kinetics, Glass Fusing, and Leatherworking. During 2024 we served 657 youth and were awarded "Best Summer Camp" by the East Bay Express.

Summer is also when our annual cohort of Fuego youth leaders join us to work in the studio alongside mentors, assist with summer camp operations, and hone their industrial art skills. During 2024 ten Fuego Leaders were selected from a competitive application process to work with staff, artists, and younger students as integral members of The Crucible's summer team. We look forward to welcoming some of our 2024 Fuego cohort back for a second year in 2025 while adding some new students.

COMMUNITY EVENTS

A Year of Creativity, Community, and Collaboration

In 2024, The Crucible deepened its connection to the community through a vibrant calendar of events that celebrated creativity, local partnerships, and inclusive access to the industrial arts. Including the three events described below, The Crucible held thirteen community events serving almost 4,000 people including the West Oakland Bike Summit, Open Studios and GIFTY:

West Oakland Bike Summit

In Spring 2024, The Crucible proudly hosted the inaugural West Oakland Bike Summit, a community-centered event co-organized with local bike advocates, youth leaders, and neighborhood organizations. The summit brought together cyclists, mechanics, policymakers, and families for a day of workshops, safety trainings, panel discussions, and bike repair services.

Open Studios

Our seasonal Open Studios welcomed the public into our 56,000-square-foot facility to explore the full range of industrial arts we teach—from welding and glassblowing to blacksmithing, ceramics, and beyond. These free events featured live demonstrations by faculty and students, giving visitors hands-on insight into the tools, techniques, and transformative power of the arts.

GIFTY

Our beloved holiday marketplace, GIFTY, returned in December as a joyful celebration of local creativity and craft. Featuring over 70 Bay Area makers, GIFTY offered one-of-a-kind gifts ranging from hand-forged jewelry and artisan soaps to leather goods, glass art, and ceramics. The event included Crucible-led demos, youth activities, and festive food and drink, creating an unforgettable seasonal experience.
